Hello Everyone

In 2020 the FCMC survived during the pandemic. The Court did not miss a day. Arraignments were held every day and our dockets continued. The Court Staff may have modified our services, but we maintained the legal process, continued working with Probationers and serving those in our Specialty Dockets.

Judge Fields, Judge Landefeld, and Magistrate Innocenti are SO PROUD OF OUR STAFF.

During 2020, we utilized a number of new processes that we will continue to use in the future. For change of plea and revocation hearings for jailed defendants, we used technology to resolve the cases without transport of the Defendants. This meant cases could be processed and if granted, and if appropriate, the release process was quicker which assisted both the jail and the Defendant.

The docket was maintained through the use of Zoom. The Court thanks both the Prosecutor's Office and the Defense Counsel for their cooperation throughout the pandemic.

The Civil docket has been a challenge because of Federal, State and CDC orders regarding evictions. The Court has met the scheduling and/or rescheduling challenges and will continue to operate in a manner consistent with the pandemic guidelines.



The Judiciary will continue to provide quality services to the community through the Justice System and for the Court.

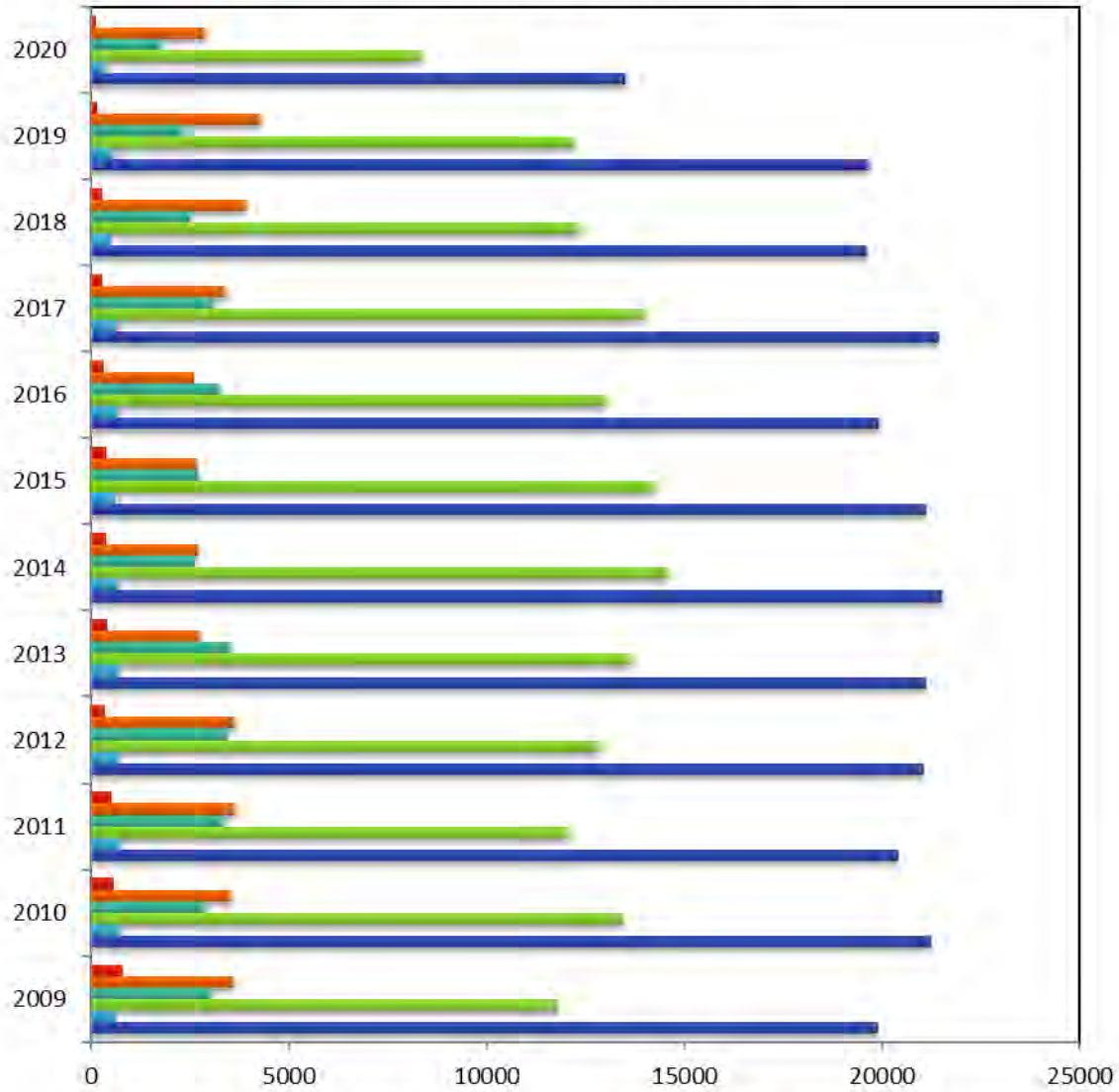

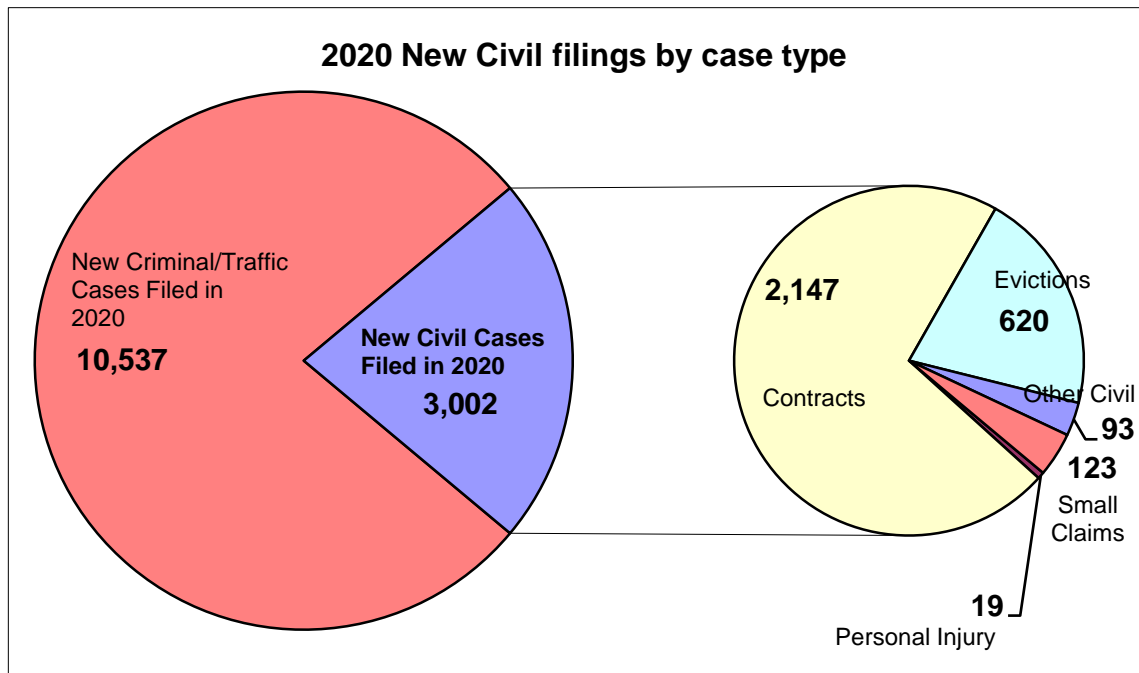
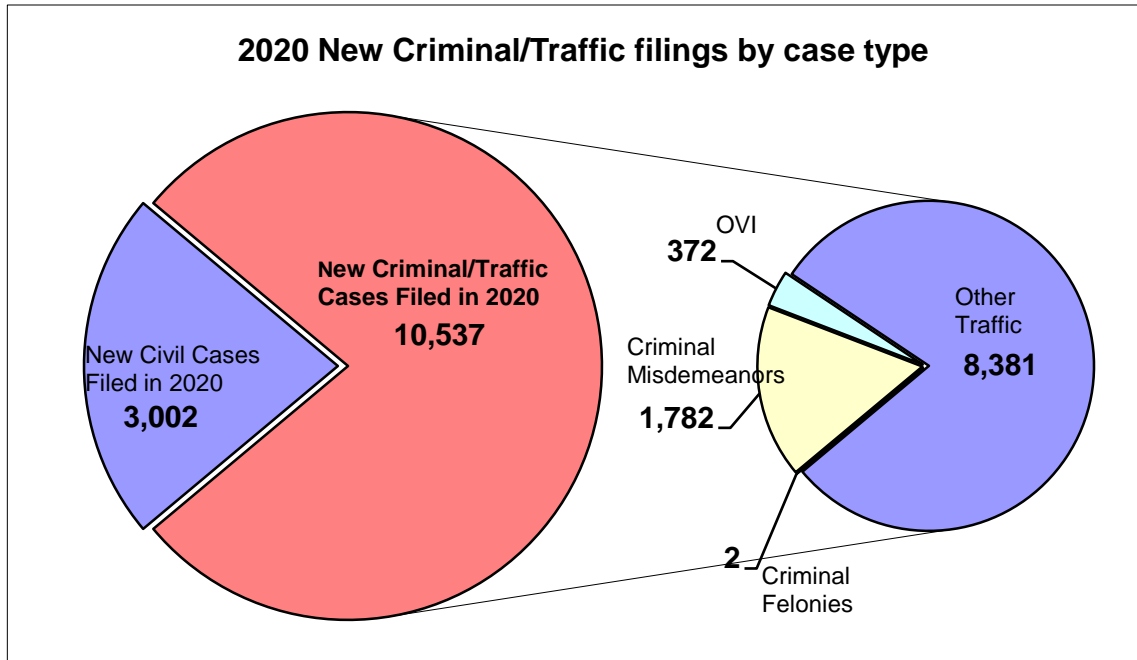
Fairfield County Municipal Court Annual Caseload Comparison

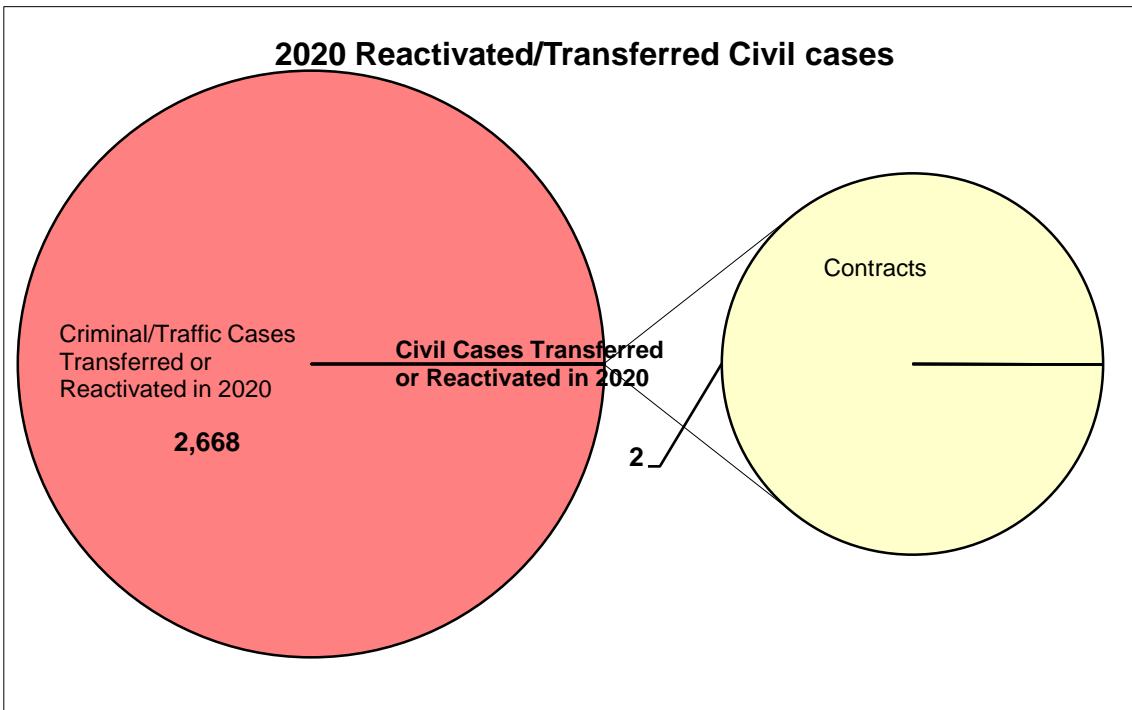
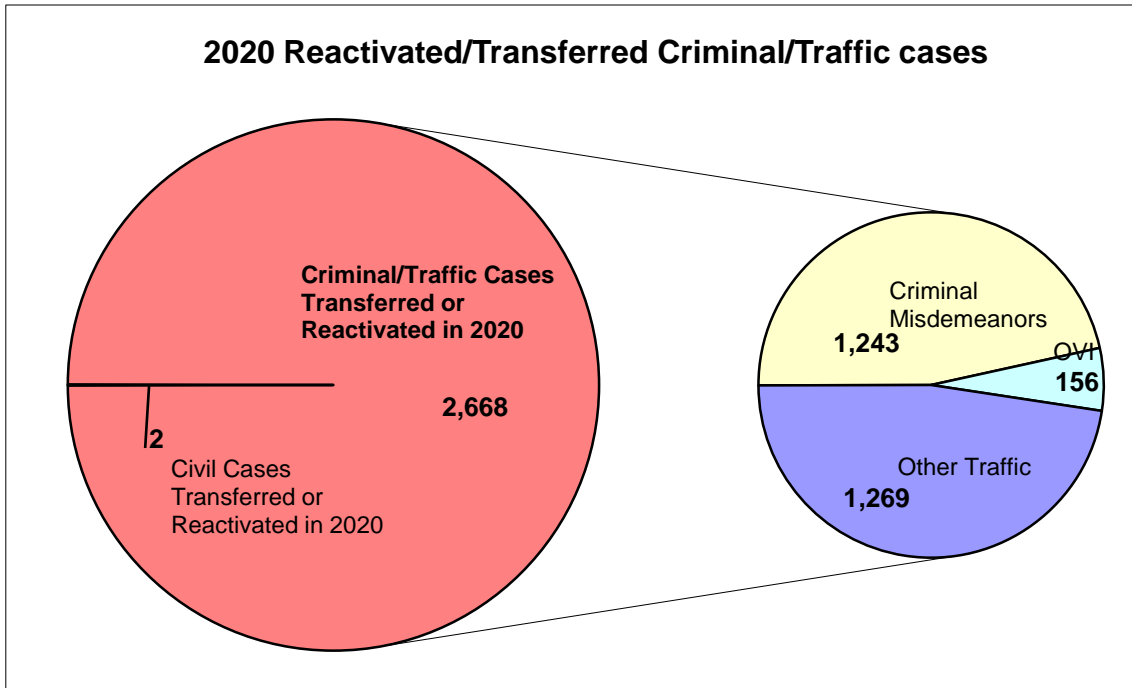
In addition to the new cases filed in various categories, the Court's caseload for 2020 also included 1,534 cases pending as of January 1, 2020.



2020 Reactivated/Transferred Cases

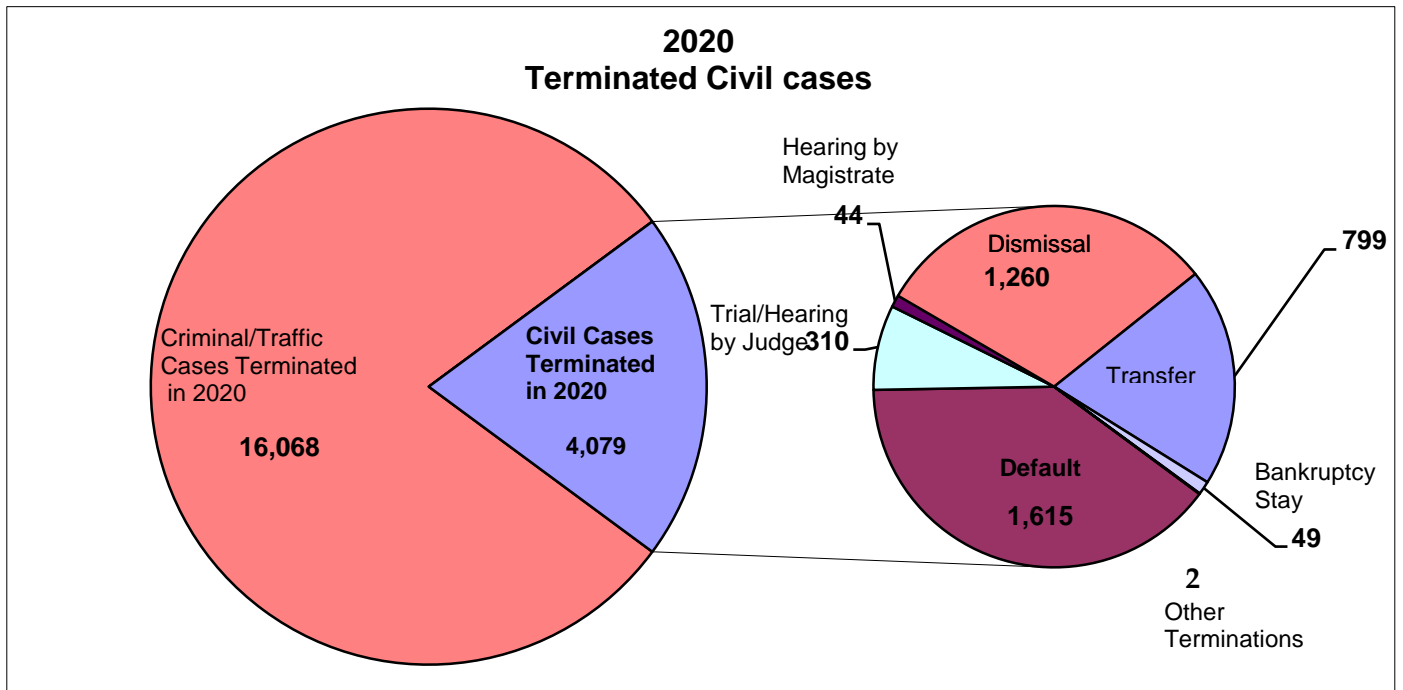
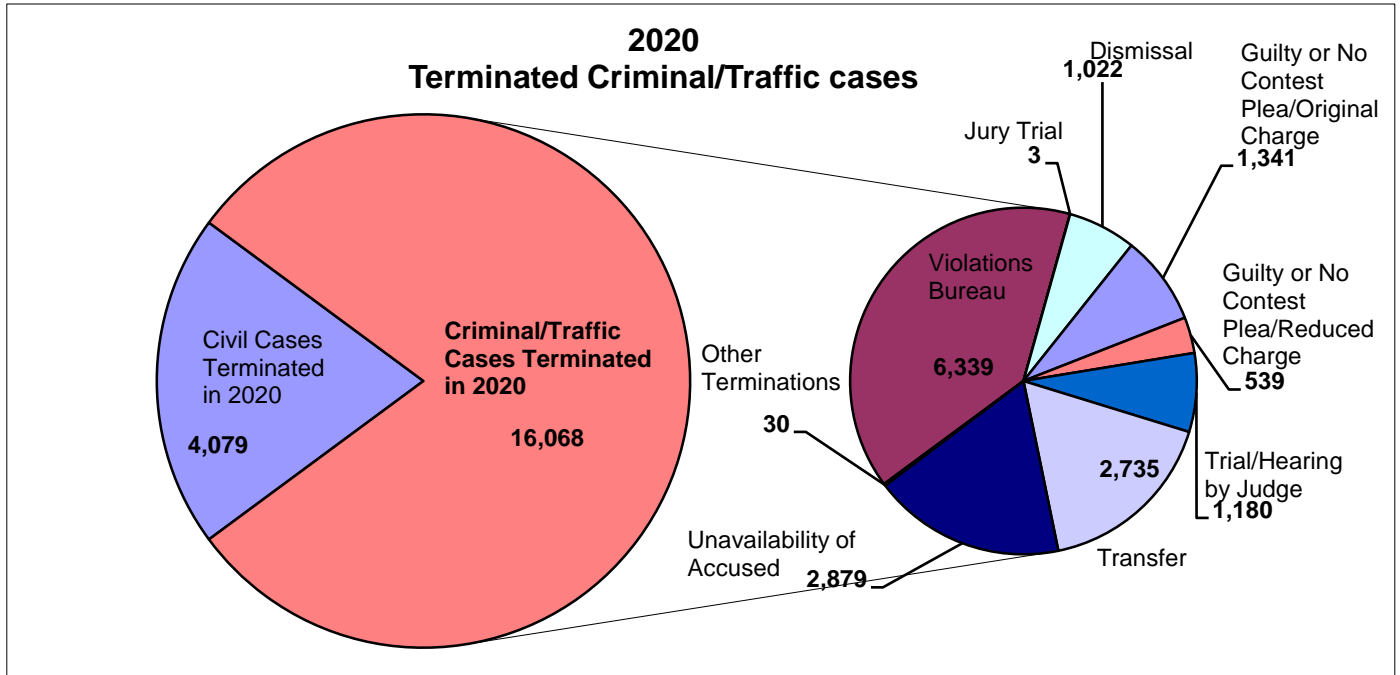
Reactivated results include: Bench warrant return, Release of forfeiture filed, etc.

Transferred results include: Plea of "not guilty" entered, guilty sentencing, grand jury indictment, etc.



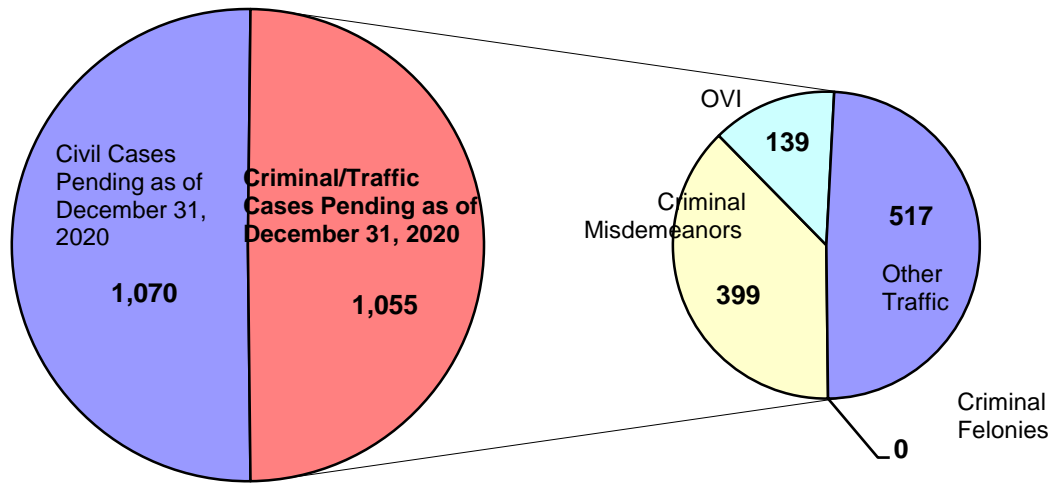
2020 Terminated Cases

Cases shown as closed by method of termination

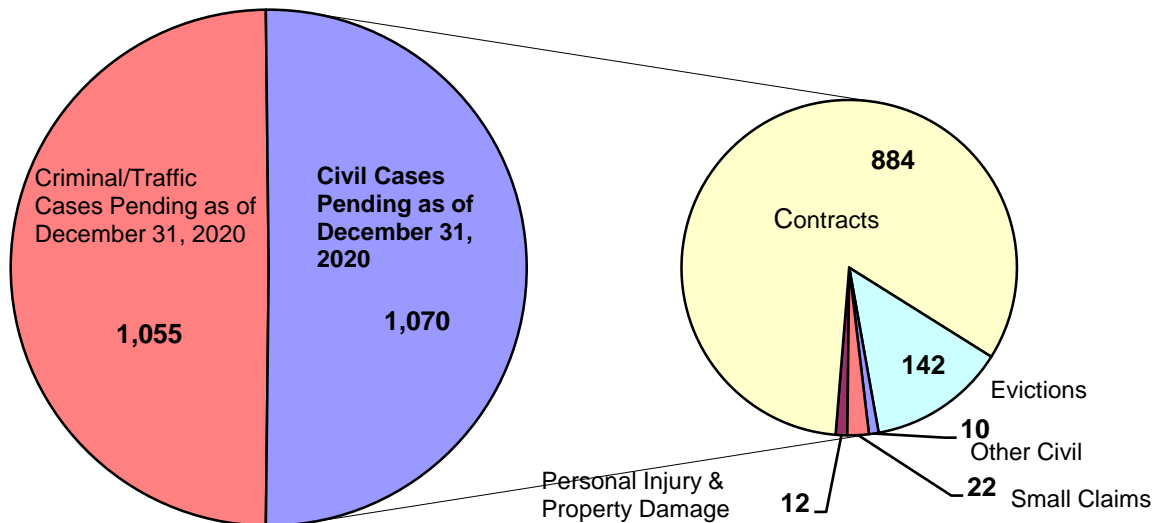


Cases Pending as of December 31, 2020

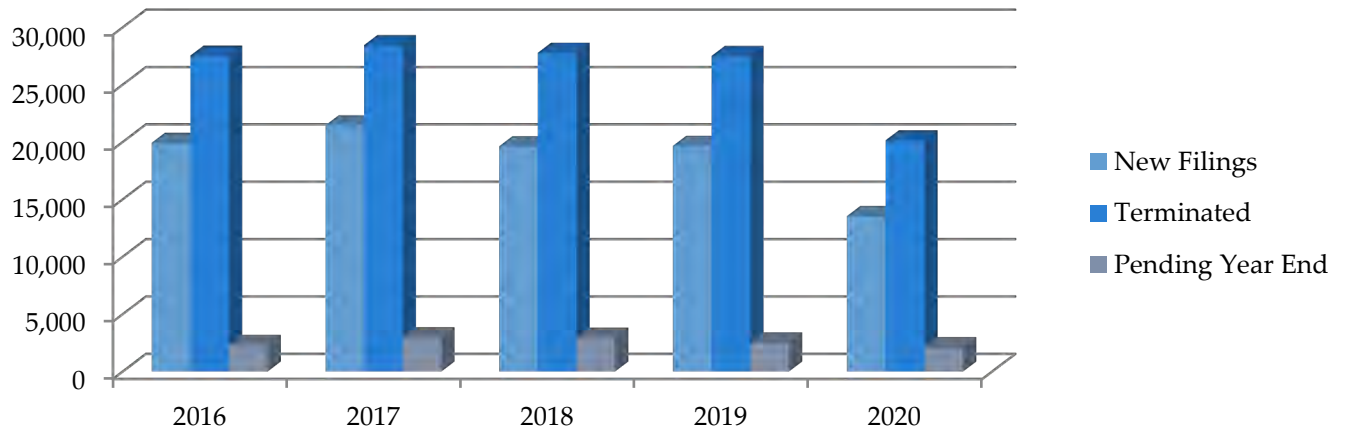
Pending Criminal/Traffic cases as of December 31, 2020



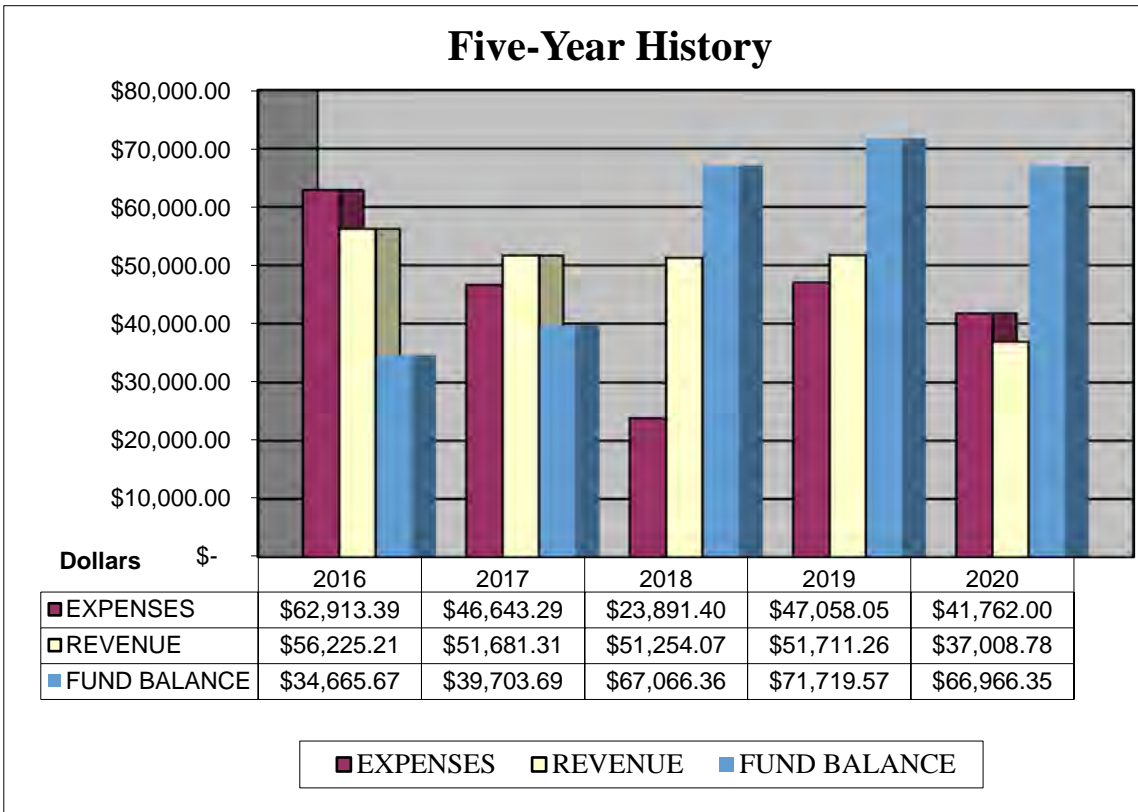
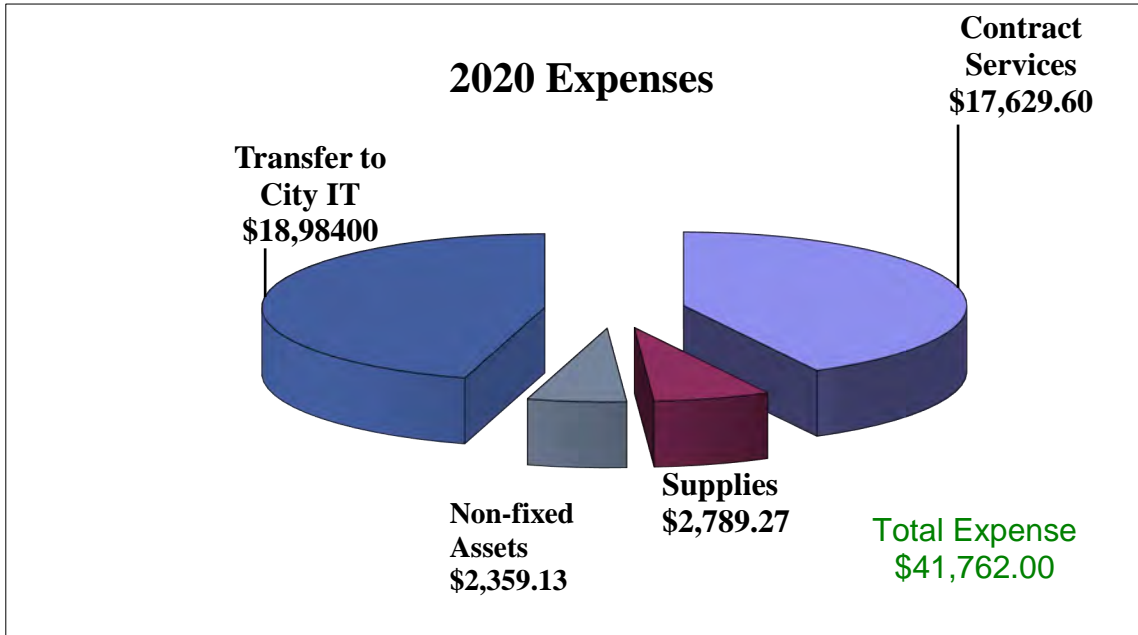
Pending Civil cases as of December 31, 2020



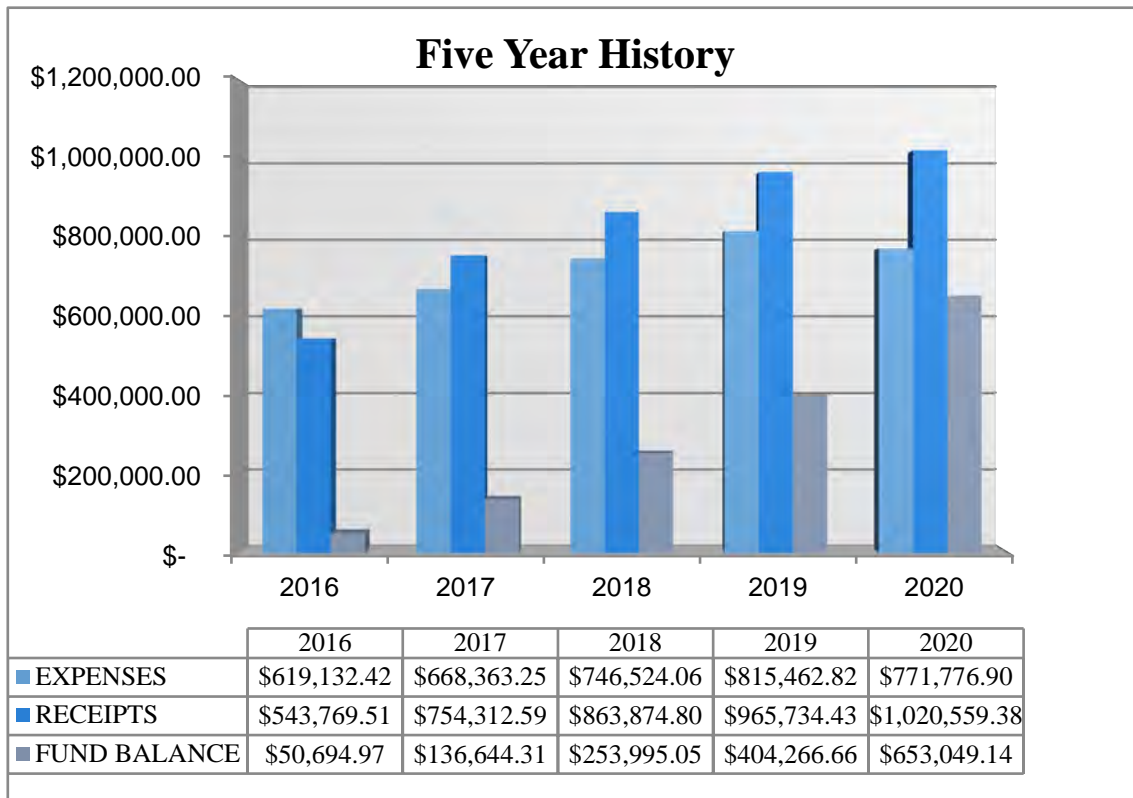
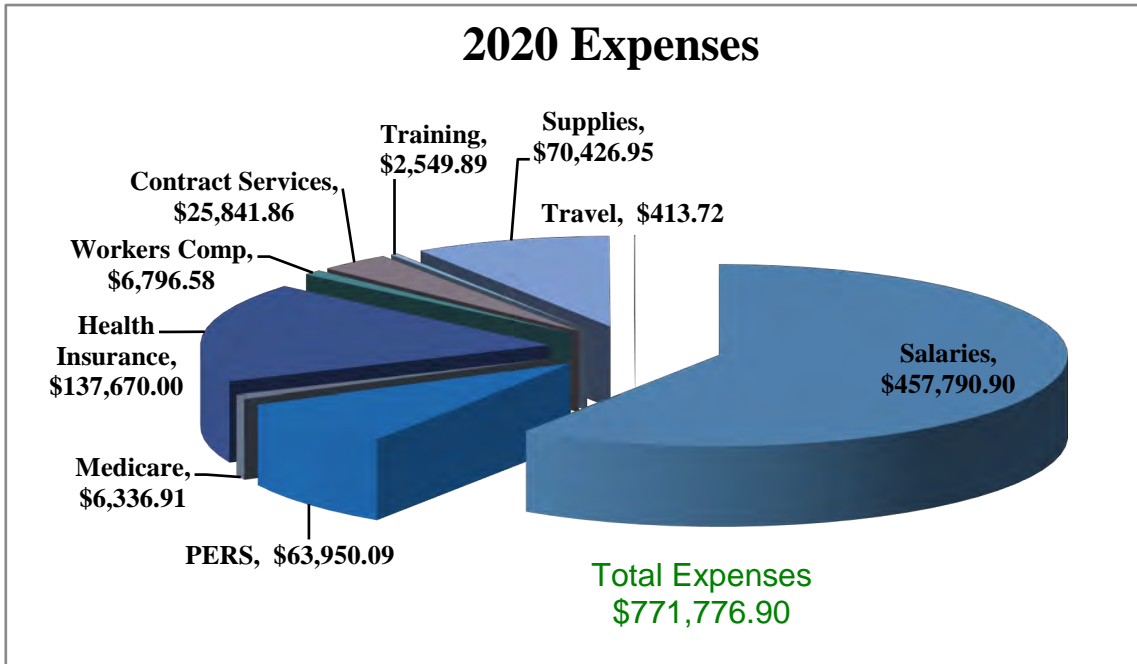

COMMON PLEAS DRUG TESTING

In the 58 months of the Municipal and Common Pleas Drug Testing collaboration project, we have reduced testing costs for Common Pleas by \$126,811.64. This program allows for greater efficiency, increased savings, faster and more detailed results, and has eliminated the need for probationers on bond/probation at both courts to test at multiple locations.

SPECIAL ABILITIES COURT: Duffy Arter, Probation Officer

In May of 2019, Fairfield Co. Municipal Court, partnered with the Fairfield Co. Board of Developmental Disabilities, began Special Abilities Court. This Specialized Docket targets those individuals, generally found incompetent to stand trial, for behavior modification and accountability. During the six months the court has to determine competency while the case is pending, participants are required to attend behavior modification classes on personal space, courtroom etiquette, anger management, public transit, etc. as well as appear before the Judge to address any behaviors that could lead to additional charges.

We have had fourteen participants benefit from the programming and eight have graduated from the program with incredible success.

VETERANS TREATMENT COURT: Laurina Sauber, Probation Officer

On October 2, 2019, Municipal Court received a Bureau of Justice Assistance Federal Grant in the amount of \$500,000 to fund the Recovery Court and add a Veterans Treatment Court for the next three years. **Laurina Sauber was selected as Veterans Treatment Court Probation Officer. A Veteran herself, she works tremendously well with this group.**

2020 GRANTS:

- \$500,000 – BJA (Bureau of Justice Assistance) Grant – (Oct. '19- Sept. '22). This is a grant to fund the Recovery Court program while also adding a Veterans Treatment Court. This funding provides money for staffing, GED testing, drug testing, and transportation.
- \$157,000 – Ohio Dept. of Rehab & Corrections JRIG (Justice Reinvestment Incentive Grant) – funds the Municipal and Common Pleas Courts' Community Service program
- \$75,000 – Ohio Mental Health and Addiction Services (2020) – Veterans Treatment funding for housing, peer support program, and drug testing supplies
- \$20,000 – Office of Criminal Justice Services (2020) – Mental Health Court grant to fund the Probation Officer, drug testing, and training for the Probation Officer and Judge
- \$40,000 – Ohio Mental Health and Addiction Services (2020) – Drug Testing supplies and Pro-pay for the Recovery Court Probation Officer
- \$38,422 – CARES Act funding – funding to purchase PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) for Municipal Court during the 2020 COVID-19 pandemic
- \$5172 – Ohio Mental Health and Addiction Services (2020) – housing funding for Mental Health Court participants
- \$30,000 – Ohio Mental Health and Addiction Services (2020) – Funding to subsidize the Mental Health Court operations
- \$250 – FOPA Grant – funds a Christmas party for participants and their families as a sober-living activity that is required for graduation

The Annual Specialized Dockets Christmas Party (modified for COVID-19): Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Christmas Party was modified to comply with social distancing. We held the "party" in the lobby by scheduling families in ten minute increments with Santa and having stations for families to transition to (a station for Santa and presents for the kids; a station for coats, hats, and gloves for the kids; a station for a Christmas ham for each family; and a station to give each child a backpack filled with books, toys, Legos, coloring books, puzzles and games). Donations were received by Defense Counsel Jason A. Price, County Prosecutor Kyle Witt, FOP Memorial Fund, staff of the Lancaster Utilities Office, Municipal Court, Law Director's Office, Clerks Office, and Lighthouse, Senator Tim Shaffer, Zion Church in Pickerington, Central Ohio Police Families Association, and several members of the public. Each child was able to receive several gifts this year. Sharon Shultz of New Horizons took family pictures with Santa again this year and each family received pictures of their kids and their family with Santa.

FAIRFIELD COUNTY COURTS COMMUNITY SERVICE PROGRAM.... The Fairfield County Municipal Court was awarded a \$156,878 continuation grant through the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Corrections to continue to fund a Community Service Probation Officer. This is a grant to fund a probation officer responsible for organizing and supervising community service workers (on probation and bond) and activities across Fairfield County in an effort to reduce the number of individuals being sent to jail. This project is a jail alternative program for Municipal Court.

2020 was a difficult year for this project due to COVID-19 quarantine regulations; however, several highway cleanup projects were completed in compliance with social distancing.

All City agencies, County agencies, 503c3 organizations, churches, and schools are eligible for services under this project.

Fairfield County Municipal Court Probation Department

2020 Annual Report

2020 was a difficult year, with COVID-19 forcing the department to make several changes and adapt to and accept a “new normal”. Nearly every aspect of the department was forced to alter the way things were normally done. The department started implementing more virtual meetings, such as Zoom meetings, more email correspondence and more phone calls, to try and reduce the number of defendants entering the building. With the pandemic spanning virtually the entire year of 2020, our probation cases were greatly reduced, due to fewer tickets being written and fewer defendant’s being placed on supervision, resulting in a decrease of nearly 1,000 defendants from the previous year. The Probation Staff has been working diligently on a daily basis in their duties as well as extra tasks, such as hourly cleaning and disinfecting surfaces throughout the building.

Our officers supervise those on Pre-Trial Bond Status, Reporting, and Non-Reporting Probation. Further, the Court has two officers dedicated to our four Specialized Dockets; Drug Court (Fresh Start Program) and Mental Health Court, Veteran’s (Patriot) Court, and Special Abilities Court. Our department also staffs two Lab Tech Probation Officers who perform duties in our Drug Testing Lab.

When a defendant is placed on supervision, the defendant will remain with the same officer from the start to expiration of their case unless the defendant enters a Specialized Docket program during the course of their probation. This change is to continue with the rapport and trust that has been established from the onset of the case.

Defendants ordered to complete probation are given sentences with terms ranging from one to five years of community control. Defendants are placed on one of the levels of Probation listed above. Defendants referred to our Specialized Dockets complete an assessment process and the cases are reviewed by the Court’s Treatment Team. The average Probation Department caseload totals normally around 3,200 cases annually. (These include defendants on 1 to 5 years’ probation and those reporting for Pre-Trial Bond monitoring. The chart below only reflects the current year.)

Probation Department Mission:

The Probation Department is committed to changing the lives of those who find themselves in need of some positive direction and overall guidance. Whether this direction is a link to services within the community that could give them a helping hand or services that could change the direction their lives are taking, the Probation Department is committed to making a difference. It is the belief of the Judges and the Probation staff that positive direction in *changing offender behavior through proven evidence-based practices* will help the betterment of the community in general by showing the benefits of what being a positive, productive member of society can be.

Probation Staff:

The Probation Department prides itself in working closely with one another for the benefit of the Defendants. The Probation Department is not made up of individual persons working in individual directions. The department is comprised of individuals working together toward a unified goal: to help defendants find a positive direction for their lives. We consider ourselves a tight-knit department who always helps one another when a need arises and cares about one another. This makes our department strong, which not only helps the community but reinforces each other as a whole in completing our work with the defendants. The probation department experienced several changes in 2019 with probation officers moving to different positions.

Matt Schein, Chief Probation Officer: Matt took over the Chief Probation Officer's position in January of 2020, and has been employed by the court since August of 2004. Matt is responsible for supervising the other probation officers and the day to day operations of the department. Matt also handles a caseload that includes: Pre-Trial, Reporting, and Non-Reporting probationers along with Intervention in lieu of Conviction (ICL) cases. Matt previously worked in Probation for Hocking County Municipal Court. Matt assists with training, drug tests, TASER certification and ORAS assessments.

Jeni Rhymer, Probation Officer has been a Probation Department employee since April 1994, and is our senior probation officer. Jeni also served as Chief Probation Officer from July 2017 to January 2020. Jeni has a caseload that consists of Pre-Trial, Reporting, and Non-Reporting probationers, and assists the Department in training, drug testing, and anything else that is needed. Jeni is also our acting chief probation officer in the absence of Matt Schein.

Halley Graham, Probation Officer joined Probation in August 2018; however, Halley has been a Court employee since December 2007. Like other probation officers, Halley handles Pre-Trial, Reporting, and Non-Reporting probationers. Halley also assists the department in any other duties that need done, such as drug testing and intakes. Halley also works as a backup assignment commissioner in the absence of Karen Lawhorn or Vicki Norris.

Justin Coverdale, Probation Officer joined Probation in January 2018. Justin handles Pre-Trial, Reporting, and Non-Reporting probationers. Justin brings with him a 5 year background in the Marine Corps. Justin assists with drug tests and helping others in the department. Justin is responsible for the court's electronic monitoring tracking and finances.

Janette Valentine, Probation Officer joined Probation in April 2018. Janette handles pre-trial, reporting or non-reporting levels. Janette previously served Fairfield County as an employee of Community Action. Janette assists with drug tests, ORAS assessments, and helping others in the department.

Diane Wilsoncroft, Administrative Assistant has been with Probation since February 2016. Diane answers phones and directs Defendants (as well as the Probation Staff) to where they need to be. She runs the arraignment reports and background reports for the Officers of defendants coming through on new charges. Diane's duties have varied greatly due to the pandemic and she has taken on responsibility for the majority of our extra cleaning duties.

Services:

The court has contracted with Sentinel to supply electronic house arrest monitoring. While this allows our defendants to remain employed and carry out normal daily tasks, it also protects the victims in the cases. Sentinel will immediately advise the Probation Department of any violations that have occurred, which in turn are addressed with the probation officer/Court as appropriate.

American Court Services (now Averhealth) is used for our Secured Continuous Alcohol Monitoring (S.C.R.A.M.), an alcohol monitoring bracelet, and a remote breathalyzing unit. American Court Services also offers drug testing service including confirmation of drug testing results through utilization of sending urine samples to a lab.

The Court utilized a total of 368 Electronic Monitoring units and 245 SCRAM units in 2020, monitored through Sentinel and American Court Services respectively.

In closing:

With the pandemic still a factor in 2021, our staff will continue to proceed with our “new normal” and move forward with court and probation proceedings. Our probation staff will continue to work on having good working relationships with local agencies to effectively help with supervising probationers. We have a capable and dedicated staff that is ready to handle any situation that may come our way.
